Constitution of India

— Arts. 226 and 227 — Discretion under exercise of — Revision against an order of the Copyright Board dismissed on ground that the proper remedy of petitioner was appeal under S. 72 of Copyright Act — Writ petition about the same matter — Not maintainable

Where a revision petition filed by the petitioner against an order of the Copyright Board was filed in the Allahabad High Court and was dismissed on the ground that proper remedy of the petitioner was an appeal under S. 73 of the Copyright Act, 1957:

Held : that it would be contrary to all notions of comity of Courts if this Court were to again deal with the matter. In case such a course is adopted it may result in the conflict of decisions of two Courts of competent jurisdiction. Such an eventuality cannot be viewed with equanimity and must be avoided at all costs. It would indeed result in abuse of the process of the Court. The petitioner cannot be allowed to by-pass the order of the Allahabad High Court by resort to these writ proceedings.

Held : further that in view of the dismissal of the revision petition by the Allahabad High Court it would be inappropriate and not a sound exercise of discretion to deal with the matter in the writ petition. [P. 634 H.]
